Prayer of Approach

Reading Ezekiel 37:1-14

Reading John 11:1-46

As our Gospel reading is a really long one, why not try reading or listening to it in four shorter parts, and spend a minute or two reflecting on the following questions.

John 11:1-16. Jesus sees a greater purpose in what appears to be a personal tragedy. This is delicate territory, because we surely would not want to see suffering and death as something that God wills or wants. What questions has our own current crisis raised for us?

John 11:17-27. Martha hears Jesus' self-affirmation, 'I am the Resurrection and the Life'. Her response suggest that, though she has faith, her faith is not yet complete, because she only goes as far as saying, 'Yes, Lord! I believe that you are the messiah, the Son of God, who was to come into the world'. This is a big affirmation, but not quite 'You are the Resurrection and the Life'. How strong is our affirmation of Jesus today?

John 11:28-37. Jesus weeps. Nowhere in the Gospels is Jesus shown to be more human, and more at one with us in our human experience. What does it mean to us today to hear the words, 'Jesus weeps'?

John 11:38-45. 'Untie him, and let him go' are words that seem to be heavy with meaning. What do they mean to us today?

Prayers for Others

The challenges we face are so great, and the burden of prayer may seem overwhelming. But we are the family of God, and as we pray, we pray together. So today, just think of the names of three individuals who you know will be struggling with the current situation, three professions or trades who are on the front line at the moment, and three areas of the world which, like us, are facing the challenge of coronavirus – and perhaps more severely. Together, we will cover a very wide circle of prayer.
