Reflection

Every one of us will be able to think of people who have been our role-models over the years. In living out our own lives, consciously or subconsciously, we will have tried to *be like* them. In living out our Christian lives, equally there will be those who have played a part in shaping our own discipleship of Jesus. Let us thank God for them!

But what of God? Can God be our role-model? Think if you will of examples from the bible when we hear something like: Because God is x, so you are, or should also be, x Here are some examples:

From Luke's Gospel: Be merciful as your father in in heaven is merciful

From John's Gospel: I pray that you may be one, as I and my father are one.

Also from John's Gospel: Love one another as I have loved you.

From The Lord's Prayer: Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

I think the last phrase of our reading from Matthew's Gospel is hinting at something very similar: 'You have received without cost; give without charge.'

Which I think could be re-written as: 'Because God has given... so you must give...'

I deliberately leave a ... blank – which I think we can fill in. God gives of God's self.

'Because God has given of God's self, so you must give of yourself'

More than that, God gives of himself in Jesus, wholly, unconditionally and graciously. 'Because God has given *of God's self in Jesus Christ,* so you must give *of yourself in his name'*.

That we can make the link between what God is like and what we are like is itself saying something about God. And that 'something' has everything to do with the fact that God is in relationship with God's creation, and therefore with us. All the things of which we can say 'Because God is, so we should be' – merciful, forgiving, loving, *giving* – are all to do with a God who *is* relationship.

So when we say, 'Because God is..., so we should be...', we are pointing in two directions. On the one hand, every good sermon should be pointing to the question – so what should I do or be? On the other hand, there is a question that is just as important: but first, what is God like – and what is God's relationship with us like?

So from Matthew's Gospel we are told: 'You have received without cost; give without charge'.

What does it mean to give without charge? That needs a huge amount of unpacking! Surely it will be different for each one of us in our own individual story of discipleship. But perhaps our recent experiences can give us more than a hint.

If we are honest, has lockdown prompted a thought process in us two voices: 'as long as I'm OK.' and 'What will keep me safe?'

And at the same time

'but what about those who are struggling and suffering?'

'How do these days challenge me to play my part?'

To the extent that we let the second voice be the louder voice, we are learning what it means to give without charge. And therefore, Matthew reminds us, we are reflecting the life of God.

'You have received without cost; give without charge.'

Communion (let us say...)

Here is bread, here is wine, Christ is with us Here is grace, here is peace, Christ is with us Here we are, joined in one, Christ is with us In this moment, by the Spirit, Christ is with us here

Prayer (based on Romans 5, 6-8)

In a week in which we contemplate what the untimely death of a single man might mean and what good, if any might come from it, we turn and bow our knee to You, Lord Christ. We thank you that, in the sovereign purposes of God, Your death had a "right time". That while we were powerless to change ourselves or to make change happen in others or in the world around us, you surrendered yourself to the will and manipulation of sinful men. You laid down your life for those who had no merit. You did not wait for us to progress to the point that we deserved mercy but you demonstrated your great love for a broken world in that while we still continued to break your commands, you died for us. We thank you.

Break the bread, taste the wine, Christ is with us here Know his grace, find his peace, Feast on Jesus here

Eat some bread with thanks - Drink from a cup in hope

In this bread there is healing - In this cup there's life forever We'll proclaim, till he comes: Jesus crucified!

Prayer after Communion (based on Matthew 9:35-10:8)

As God is loving so we go to love

As God speaks, so we proclaim peace

As God shows compassion, so we go to serve

As God has healed so we go to heal

As God sows generously, so we reap the world's Harvest

As God calls so we are sent into his harvest field
