The Virtuous Circle of Love

You will know all about vicious circles because our world is full of them.

- Someone hurts you. You seek revenge. They get their own back. Relationships break down and hatred sets in. More and more damage is done as time goes by.
- Someone loses their job. They struggle to make ends meet. They get into debt, which
 adds to their woes. The deeper into debt they get, the fewer options are open to them,
 and the harder it becomes to seek help and find solutions.
- We become a bit lonely. We turn in ourselves and become a bit reclusive. The friendships we have start to suffer. We slip out of the supportive networks we once had. We become more and more isolated.

Fortunately, our world is also full of virtuous circles.

- In a broken relationship, someone finds it in their heart to reach out to the other person. Forgiveness is expressed. The 'other' is encouraged also to review the broken relationship and finds it in their heart to forgive. Step by step, the relationship is restored, and may even end up stronger than it was.
- Someone on the edge of society is given support to take control of their lives. They start
 to stand on their own feet. Their story inspires others, and a more hopeful story starts to
 take shape.

'Love', of course, is the ultimate virtuous circle. Because I am loved by others I find it easier to love. In fact, I would say that the whole creation of which we are a part is built on the foundation of Love's virtuous circle.

Our parable of the talents contains both a virtuous, and a vicious circle. The third slave receives his talent (a phenomenally large weight of silver or gold – about 6,000 times the daily wage) with bad grace. He lacks the motivation to do anything more with it than bury it in the ground. For his inaction, he receives further punishment from his master, and the little he has is taken from him. A classic vicious circle.

Meanwhile, the first and second slaves receive their talent with good grace. They are motivated to invest it, and having doubled their master's money they are further rewarded with the ultimate prize of entering into the joy of the master's presence. Here is a virtuous circle in full swing.

So what does the parable of the talent mean to us? I hope it is reasonably obvious that Jesus is not advocating a financial model for us to employ in our world whereby we take from the poor even what they have, and reward the rich with ever greater financial rewards! (Though sadly and scandalously it is often the way of the world, and this is exactly what happens in practice.)

We would more usually use the word 'talent' to mean not a weight of gold, but a natural ability – like musicality, an artistic eye or athletic prowess. Whilst the message to use our God-given talents to their utmost is not a bad message, I think this is not the most helpful way to interpret Jesus' parable.

Rather than asking what the talents in the story might represent, I think it is most helpful to see this as an invitation from Jesus to us to leave behind the vicious circle that starts, as for the third slave, with a relationship of fear; and to enter instead into the virtuous circle that begins from the foundation of a loving, obedient response to God.

Caught up in the virtuous circle of God's love, we will be well-equipped to foster and enter into the virtuous circles of our world where forgiveness leads to forgiveness, mercy leads to mercy, generosity leads to generosity, and love leads to ever greater love.

Prayers of Intercession

So, generous Father, in praying for our world, we are conscious of the awesome responsibility You give to each of us to make it a place of compassion, love and mercy - a place where we empower people to grow and love and give in their turn...

First of all, we confess that we have not received nor used all Your gifts with grace or openness. Like the servant in the parable, we have looked at Your gifts through jaundiced eyes of self-denigration; we have projected our low self-expectations onto You, seeing You as a hard and demanding task-master. We have served grudgingly and with a lack of generosity; we have buried Your gifts in the cold ground of our greed. Lord, forgive us.

But now, from this moment, help us turn joyfully to You by Your grace. Sensing Your welcome and knowing Your generous love, may we receive Your gifts with good grace and use them unstintingly for the sake of Your Kingdom.

Pour out Your gifts on Your people by Your Spirit, helping us to perceive, understand and offer our talents that we may build one another up in faith and grow in the likeness of Christ. Strengthen the ministry of all in Your Church who seek to help Your children discover and develop their gifts. Help their ministry be one of empowerment, that the gifts of Your people may multiply in their effect.

Help and support all those in our society who are denied the opportunity to use their talents, those who are unemployed, denied training, those discouraged by the criticism of others and those obstructed in their education. We pray especially today for teachers and pupils who are suffering illness or who lack resources.

Guide our leaders in politics, industry and commerce, that we might become a generous society in which those with very little are strengthened to use what they have to find dignity in providing for themselves and their loved ones and fulfilment in serving others. May those who have been granted much realise that everything they have is a gift from You, so may they be motivated to share.

Help us use the gifts we have been given wisely, not squandering them but sharing and storing them for tomorrow, not just the gifts of the earth and all its food and resource, but gifts of learning, medicine, technology, justice and peace. Above all, we pray that we may protect the gift of the earth itself, its seas, rivers, fields and forests - that all Your children may live together in abundance in Your world.

Finally, we pray that we may be careful and generous stewards of the greatest gift of all, Your love; that all may know the care and compassion that You long to lavish on them. Help us tend and nurture the message of the Gospel as we share Your love with friends, family and neighbours. May we nurture, also, the gifts that come from Your love: service and truth in politics, advancement in medicine and science, enterprise and prosperity in commerce and politics, co-operation and peace among the nations, care and concern for those in need.

So we bring those who are on our hearts at this time (name anyone you are concerned about here) and we pray that in using all our gifts, we may speed the advancement of Your Kingdom in word, deed and prayer...so we pray as Christ taught us...

Father of us all, may Your name be honoured in Your world May we perceive and build Your Kingdom as Your purposes are accomplished in our daily living.

Please give us everything we need each day. Cover our failings with Your grace so that grace may overflow to those who hurt us. Strengthen us when we are challenged and lead us through difficult days.

And, as we learn to trust:
That You order all things
And can accomplish all things,
So may we praise You in all things
As You deserve - Amen
