# Readings



**Psalm 147 –** how good is it to sing praises to our God

**John 1:1-18 –** the light shines in the darkness and it is the true light which gives light to everyone

**Ephesians 1: 3-14** – to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ

#### Reflection

Prayer before reflection - May my inadequate words, by God's grace and by the power of the Holy Spirit, make way for Christ the Living Word to find a room in our hearts.

At the close of the year we look back and remember famous people who have, to use a quaint phrase, "left us". One notable departure was of Argentinian footballer Maradona. Or as I like to call him "Marmitedona" (because you either loved or hated him). He was divisive, brilliant yet flawed: a footballing genius but also a cheat (with a hint of blasphemy... will English fans ever forgive his "Hand of God" comment?)

Like him or loathe him, he WAS an inspirational figure. The 1986 Argentinian team were an unremarkable bunch. Few of them would have been picked for the other teams of the day. Yet, with Maradona leading them, they became world beaters.

At the beginning of his ministry, Jesus presents us with a straightforward challenge: "Turn and believe the Good News" This is a simple choice of two realities: God is nowhere or now here. God, born in a lowly stable and laid in a manger, is now with us - or he isn't. God is caring for his world and steering it towards a hopeful future - or he isn't. Later on the choice of believing would also be straightforward: Jesus has conquered death - or he hasn't.

The consequences of believing the positive answers are profound. Yes, doubts will always remain and difficult days will always come, but, ultimately, by faith and hope, we can live hopeful lives that are touched by a transforming compassion for others. The Church through the incarnation and resurrection of Jesus, and through the presence of the God who is captaining our team, become "world beaters" - against all the odds.

And so, in his letter to the Ephesians, Paul, no doubt holding in his mind the wonderful promises of the Psalms and the prophet Jeremiah, sets out the amazing things that God has done for us in Christ. The whole epistle is a remarkable exposition of God's decisive action in history through Christ and the implications for us as individuals, for families, for whole communities and, indeed the whole human race!

The first few verses of the first chapter of the Epistle (in our lectionary reading) set the tone. Paul speaks of three things:

A life of blessing (verse 1) - in Christ, he has blessed us with every spiritual resource of the life of Heaven. There is no task we cannot accomplish, no challenge we cannot face, no difficulty we cannot endure through the generous help and support of the Holy Spirit of our Father, given through Christ

A way of being (v4) - in Christ, He chose us before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love - we are called to lives of blameless love which means striving for full-hearted excellence in our service to one another and to the wider world, in lives that speak in word and action of the love, grace, compassion and kindness of God in Christ

A place of belonging (v5) - in Christ, he was pleased to mark us out for adoption as his children. This was God's great pleasure, not to keep us at a distance or in a state of fear, wallowing in a sense of guilt and failure. But to know that we are accepted in his love, a precious and valued part of his family. How blessed we are to be called the children of God!

This is God's amazing intention towards us. Can we grasp it? No wonder Paul follows with a thankful prayer for God's Spirit to enable us to know three things, not just in our heads but in the depths of our hearts (*Ephesians 1, 16-20*):

- the HOPE to which we have been called
- the RICHES of kindness and compassion that we have through our life with God
- the POWER that is at work within us the power that raised Christ from the dead

As we turn into 2021 and challenges continue, and hope beckons, may we make that our prayer for ourselves and each other. Wishing you a blessed new year with love in Christ
