Reflection

Welcome to our first Sunday in Lent – the season of 40 days in the Christian calendar where we focus on reflection, preparation and fasting before the celebrations of Easter and new life. This Sunday our lectionary readings talks to us about the covenant which God made with Noah and commissioning of Jesus at his baptism.

As we explore the story of the flood which lasted 40 days we are given pictures of lots of water, many animals, the sky and a promises. These all link to our environment and our stewardship of the earth. As we mark this Sunday – which is also Church Action on Poverty Sunday we consider how God's promises are still true today and how Jesus' ministry to the poor is a relevant today as our society struggles to address the underlying causes of poverty.

Over the past year we have seen rainbows everywhere and in all shapes and sizes as we have displayed them as a way of saying "Thank You" to the NHS. It has also been a sign of hope and healing. As it was to Noah and his family that God had made a promise and to all creation that the world would not be destroyed by flood. I believe that most traditions have a 'flood story' and one that reminds humanity that there is a God (Creator) who cares for all creation.

The last year we have seen fires and floods to maybe rival some of the rains which Noah had experienced. It seemed as if while one half of the world was burning the other half was under water. For us across Yorkshire, last month there were 98 flood warnings and a number of amber alerts. Thankfully some of were spared but others are still repairing the damage to their homes. In Genesis, God speaks to Noah and makes a covenant with him and the whole of creation, so when we see the bow in the clouds we remember the promise which God made and that gives us hope.

In the Gospel reading we share in Jesus' baptism by recalling (if we are able to) our own baptism and our journey being part of the family of God. The baptism, then, was a visible sign of that God was still speaking. God affirmed who Jesus was in Mark's narrative, the voice from heaven fulfils the purpose of identifying Jesus' origin: he might come from Nazareth, a place of low honour, but he is God's son. The divine voice makes an astonishing affirmation and Jesus comes out of the water filled with the Sprit and sets off on his ministry.

He completely renounced the old order and proved to be a genuine disciple, who followed his Father's will. When he returned to Nazareth and he visited the synagogue he was handed the scroll and he read: "The Spirit of the LORD is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be released, that the blind will see, that the oppressed will be set free, and that the time of the LORD's favour has come"

He rolled up the scroll, handed it back to the attendant, and sat down. All eyes in the synagogue looked at him intently. Then he began to speak to them. "The Scripture you've just heard has been fulfilled this very day!"

So, what are we doing to fulfil the scriptures today? Well, today as we reflect on the readings, reflect on next fortnight as Fair Trade and this Sunday as Church Action on Poverty, we are challenged to walk the way Jesus did and work to create a world which is described in the song written for this Sunday by Andrew Pratt: **A brave new world.** Andrew describes a brave new world where there is common wealth and a dream we will work to accomplish. Part of our work as a church is to support others who are actively working to fulfil this dream and in doing so we pray God's kingdom come.

Church Action on Poverty enables people in poverty to speak out for themselves. We know that when people speak truth to power, they can make real change that tackles the root causes of UK poverty. In recent years, our campaigns have delivered real policy change on issues including Universal Credit, holiday hunger, and measuring food insecurity.

The past year has reminded us all of the values that matter most: mutuality, compassion and community. As we journey forward together, we have the chance to do things differently. If we are to build a society in which everyone can live a full life, free from poverty, we must ensure the voices of people who are struggling to make ends meet are heard. Please pray as your prayers can make a difference.

To do this, we want a voice that expresses our needs and is listened to by politicians. We need a way of doing things founded on fresh thinking and the real needs of poor people. Help us move forward in your light.

Help the churches to pray for and support those in need. We pray for the young, for the old, for those with children and for the sick. For people with disabilities, we ask especially for recognition and respect for all kinds of disabilities, whether physical or mental and whether visible or not. We bring all these people to you because you are concerned about them, as Jesus was when he was here in the body. Help us move forward in your light.

Lord, give us justice for the poor.

O God, before you all empires must fall, all tyranny be overthrown, all injustice put right; open our eyes to the true cost of following you, open our minds to the imperial legacy of our lands, our institutions, our church, hidden in plain sight around us, that we may truly take up our cross, and resist the might of emperor and usurper, so that your people might be free.
