Opening words

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark,

Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. So she came running to the other disciples and said,

"They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!"

Come let us listen to the words of the angel as we worship this Easter Day.

Prayer of approach, confession and thanksgiving

Risen Lord Jesus, we thank you, Risen Lord, we are the Easter people, and Alleluia is our song. We are the Easter people come to worship, released from tombs of pain and doubt and fear and death into the freedom of this new day, and its promise of hope fulfilled.

We are the Easter people, emerging into the brightness of faith, blinking, questioning, wondering, and hoping.

Come to us, into the garden of our lives, and touch all that is barren, and wasted and dried with your healing hand.

We confess that, like Mary and the other disciples, we are prone to self-reliance: our best laid plans to tend to your broken body are thwarted by the new purposes of your resurrection.

We confess that we are prone to despair: when things can't get any worse, we find the tomb empty and the focus of our living is thrown into confusion.

As you call us by our name, we hear, we open our eyes and we respond, with Mary, in worship to you.

Readings



Isaiah 25:6-9 – he will swallow up death for ever

Psalm 118:14-24 – I thank you that you have answered me

Mark 16: 1-8- "Go tell Peter and the disciples that he is going ahead of you..."

1Corinthians 15: 1-11 – but by the grace of God, I am what I am...

Reflection

This Gospel that begins by announcing "the beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, and ends in fear and silence: "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" — Luke 16:8. The women were commissioned by an angel but they were still confused and frightened. They would no doubt have forgotten what the angel said to them.

After all the preparation and teaching, Jesus has been getting his disciples for what is to come. Three times he has told them that he must undergo great suffering, be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. After his Transfiguration, when Jesus came down the mountain, he told Peter, James, and John to tell no one what they had seen until after he had risen from the dead. Peter almost immediately spoke to Jesus and not to say such things and he was severely scolded by Jesus.

Today on Easter Day, where are they now? The women seem to provide some hope—Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome had come early on this first day of the week to perform one final act of service for Jesus—to anoint his body for burial. There is no body to be anointed, however. Instead, a young man in a white robe, shares with the news that Jesus has been raised, and then commissions them to "go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you" (16:7).

Throughout his ministry, Jesus had told his disciples that he was going to die. They struggled to understand that and now he is making his way to Galilee. Why should that make any sense at all? The women who were part of the group of disciples would have heard the same teaching. But now they are commissioned to proclaim the good news that Jesus has been raised and they run away in fear.

The risen Jesus does not appear in Mark. We are left, with the women, in their fear and confusion, until they finally meet up to share the good news. See I am behaving like the Gospel writers and trying to put an end to the story. We have no evidence that they did bump into Peter, so we are left with an unfinished story. Is that a bit like our lives sometimes? Who is waiting to hear the end of the story about *Evergiven* the ship which has blocked the Suez Canal? Who would have thought it would have taken so long to re-float it?

So despite its unsettled, unsatisfying ending of the resurrection story in Mark, it creates anticipation and gives reason to hope. Why? Because the tomb is empty, because death could not hold Jesus down. And because the women have received the message: "Go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you" (16:7).

Mark's story has given us every reason to believe that what Jesus promises will take place, because his word has already been fulfilled in many important ways. He has died and risen and he will meet his disciples in Galilee, and the good news will be proclaimed. The women must have spoken eventually, after all; otherwise we would not have this story Mark tells.

In conclusion, as we make our way to Galilee, our hope is that God will bring to completion the redemptive, restorative and reconciling work already begun in Jesus Christ, as God has promised.

God of Resurrection for the Church we pray, that in our work and witness we may be generous in our believing, and joyful in our serving.

Help us to blend tradition and newness, to keep our faith and work a power for good, and a dynamic for reconciliation and renewal.

This Easter Day, this new beginning, this time of lifting up, lift up our heads and hearts,

lift up our eyes and voices as we raise these prayers to you. Amen
