Readings

Reflection

In today's Gospel reading, which feels like a repeat of the Easter story. We recount the appearance of Jesus to his disciples. It is almost as if we needed to hear it again as the last time Thomas wasn't there and so we need to hear things from his point of view. There is a clearly a number of themes throughout the reading in that the disciples are locked away, they are frightened and then Jesus appears to them.

They are then even more terrified. Jesus convinces them that he is their teacher and friend and he puts their minds at rest by retelling them the stories in the Scripture. His final act of sharing a meal with them, brings to light who is really is. Perhaps part of their fear and disbelief as to do with the fact that they all ran away when Jesus needed them most and they were terrified of facing him again and having to explain their actions.

If you had run away, what would you say to Jesus now that he was standing here in your presence?

The story which precedes our reading today is the well-known Emmaus Road reading and the joy and excitement of the two disciples who encountered Jesus on the road, they share stories and heard words from scripture. It wasn't until they broke bread together that they realised who their guest was. So they hurried back to Jerusalem (a bit of a walk, about 20 miles) to share the news with the others.

So this was the moment when they were asking each other 'What are they talking about?' They can just about catch their breath but they were explaining that they saw Jesus. It wasn't the witness of the empty tomb, the women telling them that they had met Jesus or the testimony of an out of breath Cleopas and his companion, or even seeing him for themselves that convinced these disciples of the truth that Jesus was alive, but seeing him eat fish!

Jesus continues his explanation by opening to them the scriptures to show that everything they have learned and taught before his crucifixion has led them to this very moment. He could have reprimanded and given them a hard time by questioned them, "How many times do you have to see and hear before you believe?" Interestingly, Luke does not tell us if all of the disciples finally believed. Are there times in our lives today where fear and doubt drive out the presence of Jesus?

Rather Jesus helps them to see the reality of the resurrection by eating with them. Do we need to share a meal with Jesus and hope that we are enlightened not only by his presence but by is love and care for us. Somehow the ordinariness of this action allows the extraordinariness of God to break through and reassures them.

Where is the extraordinariness of God breaking through in the ordinariness of our lives?

Jesus says, 'You are witnesses of these things.' This is both a statement of fact and a commissioning. The disciples who have experienced these things first hand are now given the responsibility to bear witness to what they have seen and heard. Through the Easter season as we have reflected on the life of Christ, we are also called to witness.

The resurrection prompted the disciples think in a new and different way – to reinterpret all that had gone before in the light of this event.

Joy, disbelief and wondering: a bucketful of mixed emotions. The disciples still hadn't got it all sorted. They didn't fully understand what had happened or what it all meant, but nevertheless, Jesus entrusts to them the task of witness. And he goes on to promise the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower them.

It is easy in our world today for us to think that we have to have it all sorted, but Jesus uses us just as we are, in certainty and confusion, in joy and despair, and challenges us to bear witness to what God is still doing in our world.

In conclusion, this is where we come into the story. We come, yes ... we come with our doubts, confusions, fears and misunderstandings. We, each week, through worship we encounter the risen Christ. The Holy Spirit brings enlightenment, hopefully, opening our hearts and minds, setting our hearts on fire. Finally, we are asked to go and be witness to this amazing good news.

So if Jesus appeared now what would he ask you for?
