# Reflection

Welcome to Trinity Sunday.

Traditionally, it is the Sunday which the minister takes off. That is because the Trinity is a controversial doctrine and can be very difficult to explain. Many Christians admit they don't understand it, while many more Christians don't understand it but think they do. In fact, although they'd be horrified to hear it, many Christians sometimes behave as if they believe in three Gods and at other times as if they believe in one. Trinity Sunday, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost is one of the few feasts in the Christian calendar that celebrate an actual doctrine rather than an event.

So in order to help people understand the Trinity we sometimes will ask them to think about things which come in three or can appear in three different forms but is one single item. The most popular one which a lot people think of is water. Water can come in the form of ice when frozen and steam when it is heated and it is still water. Water plays an important part in trying to understand the Trinity. Another example is from St Patrick who used the shamrock to explain the Trinity. Can you think of other examples?

In an attempt to explain a little about the Trinity, I tend to see the three in one as *community* and the one in three as *unity*. The words flow from each other and together and with us we can bring the kingdom of God here on earth. The picture above which is an icon created by Russian painter, Rublev represents the three angels who visited Abraham and Sarah to tell them they were going to have a son, and this interpreted as a representation of the Trinity. So let us start in Genesis. In the beginning the Spirit moved over the surface of the water. The word 'Trinity' was not specifically mentioned but as she moved over the water, in the Creation story, and there was Jesus with God the Creator.

The New Testament doesn't use the word Trinity either, but in Matthew's Gospel we see reference to the three in one ... "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always to the end of the age." (*Matthew 28:19 & 20*). Last week as we celebrated Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit, the disciples were at one in unity and their baptism by the Spirit led them to form a community.

So many theologians and philosophers have argued that the doctrine of the Trinity is fairly pointless and has no real relevance to being a Christian. However, I would like to take a few minutes to show that the Trinity is the very essence of our faith and it matters a great deal. In history in 1054 when the churches tried to explain the Trinity it caused a great schism and to this day the split still exists. We would only tie ourselves up in more knots if we go down that route. Maybe another time. So let us see how Nicodemus' encounter with Jesus takes us some way to explore living life in community and unity of the Trinity.

Jesus and Nicodemus discussed what it meant to be born again by the Spirit. This happens shortly after Jesus clears the Temple, creating an interesting link with what it means to live a holy life pleasing to God. In this passage, Jesus instructs Nicodemus on how to become part of the kingdom of God. It is not a set of steps to follow; rather, Nicodemus is told he must be born again. He misses the point which Jesus is trying to make and he failed to recall that at Jesus' baptism the Spirit appeared like a dove and voice of God confirmed Jesus as the beloved Son. This was all happening while Jesus was still in the water.

From the reading Nicodemus' somewhat earthly questioning provided Jesus opportunity to teach us about heavenly things, including God's loving plan for the world and the role of the Son of Man in that plan. God is discovered hidden in plain sight in our individual and communal lives: awesomely 'other'; intimately close; sometimes both.

When we come to worship, we come to encounter God. Like Nicodemus we can ask questions but we need to understand that our encounters with God draw us into deeper, more wholesome and interconnected relationships. We find that God is untameable yet present to every leaf and flower. God is wonderfully comforting, yet uncomfortably challenging! His visible presence is everywhere, yet elusive, as if God had just gone around the corner. So, in this encounter Jesus challenges Nicodemus to move from theory to practice, from knowledge to faith, from curiosity to commitment. Jesus challenges us to do the same.

Jesus used the term 'being born from above' to challenge Nicodemus to a deeper understanding of God's work in the world. Nicodemus would be familiar with the notion of God as king, but this challenge to be born from above/again to "see" this kingdom pushes him to expand his notions of God and kingship and "see" Jesus beyond a (Rabbi) a teacher sent from God and a miracle-worker. Nicodemus shows he hasn't grasped the spiritual intention of Jesus' "above" when he asks about the biological possibility of being born "again." This naive misunderstanding happens time and again across Jesus' ministry, but allows Jesus opportunity to teach, here about the nature of the Spirit and the need to be born of the Spirit. The Baptist testified that the one coming baptizes with the Holy Spirit (John 1:29-34). This promise is fulfilled in the Spirit brought by Jesus.

In conclusion I want to mention something Jesus said to Nicodemus "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." This text has been used to save people spiritually from their sins, but I think it is time for us to understand that the eternal life promised by Jesus has to do with the life we live now.

The eternal life promised by Jesus that comes through the presence of the Spirit can only be understood if it is fully drenched in the waters of our world and the wombs of our mothers. Thus, there is eternity in every river and in all the oceans as there is eternity in the work of the Spirit and in the love of God through Jesus. For the Spirit of God is also made of waters. Remember the Spirit at creation.

If we look around our world today we are drying up, both naturally and spiritually (I know with the weather we have been having it may not feel like it). We need a fresh out pouring of the Spirit. We need to care for the water (our blue planet) so the Spirit can continue working in our lives and in our world. We must start to relate the life of the Trinity that is the life of God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, with our lives.

So we can relate together, in unity and community. More than ever, we need to gain a new awareness of the Spirit, so that we can finally understand the eternal love of God for the world. By God's mercy they will be not merely forgiven, but made whole, remade in God's image as one people, equal in all ways. Living in the Spirit, through the love shown to us by the Son we can indeed bring God's kingdom here - It is a way of living and a way of being. May God give us to strength to live our eternal lives here and now. Amen
