Opening words Psalm 138

I give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart; before the gods I sing your praise; I bow down toward your holy temple and give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness; for you have exalted your name and your word above everything. On the day I called, you answered me, you increased my strength of soul. All the kings of the earth shall praise you, O Lord, for they have heard the words of your mouth.

They shall sing of the ways of the Lord, for great is the glory of the Lord.

For though the Lord is high, he regards the lowly; but the haughty he perceives from far away. Though I walk in the midst of trouble, you preserve me against the wrath of my enemies; you stretch out your hand, and your right hand delivers me.

Let us listen to the words of Jesus, words that we can trust: "Yours sins are forgiven." Merciful God, empower us to live our lives embodying your "Good News" to everyone we encounter. We this prayer in and through the name of Jesus, our Saviour. Amen

Readings

Reflection

Family. There is a well-known saying that: 'Family comes in all shapes and sizes." Our families often form our earliest memories, shape our first dreams and aspirations; teach us how to live with others and influence our relationships and behaviour.

In our Gospel reading from Mark this morning, we are presented with a really vivid and action-packed story about family. Imagine the scene, a massive crowd is following Jesus and the disciples. A crowd who are jostling for position: eager to hear what Jesus has to say, eager to see what he will do. And in the midst of the crowd, the religious leaders, the scribes are present: checking to see what Jesus will say, checking to see what Jesus will do. Checking that Jesus does not say or do anything that is contrary to the religious teachings and laws of the day. Jesus' family appear: apprehensive about what Jesus will say, apprehensive about what He will do.

Did you notice the words from the reading, referring to His family: 'they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind."

They are deeply concerned that His preaching, teaching, and miracle-working are signs of erratic behaviour. Because they loved him, to be sure, but also to protect him and the family name.

When the crowd says that his family is summoning him from outside the crowded building, Jesus answers with a deeply shocking statement: "Who is my mother? Who are my brothers? ... Look, here [these people seated around me] are my mother and my brothers. Whoever does God's will is my brother, sister and mother."

In Jesus' culture, where responsibility, identity, stability, and opportunity were all so bound up with kinship structures, Jesus' pronouncement of a new family would have been deeply shocking. And yet, it also can bring great joy to some, especially those followers who find themselves estranged, rejected or excluded from their own families of origin.

And today, there are two ways of reading, two ways of hearing Jesus's words. We can read and hear these words as rejection. A rejection of the family who raised him, who protected him. And yet, there is also another way of reading and hearing Jesus' words. Rather than rejection, can we hear these words as an expansion? An expansion of how we define family – an expansion of who is included, an expansion of who is loved and cared for. In this context, listen once again to those words Jesus speaks to the crowd:

"Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

Indeed, they express, as did Jesus with his life, his teaching, his example, and in these words, that whatever our own experience of family, whether it is a source of joy or sorrow, pleasure or pain, or a mixture of both, we are all, each one of us, part of God's family. A family in which love reaches out far beyond biological ties and genetic kinship, a family in which all are wanted, all are welcome, all are longed for and loved, all are cherished and chosen, and all can truly belong.

Can you imagine how earth-shattering, how life-changing these words, this message are for individuals and groups in Jesus' society who have been rejected?

Can you imagine how earth-shattering, how life-changing these words, this message continues to be for communities, for individuals who are rejected today?

With this in mind, when you are lesbian or gay, rejection by biological family, is still a deeply painful and living reality. Sometimes the response of your family, when you come out as gay, is expulsion from home, exclusion from those you love and care for. Sometimes the reaction of your family, may result in a rather grudging toleration instead of affirmation and celebration of your true self. A person who is made in the image of God, made in and for love.

I wonder, who in our church, in our society and in our world today experiences rejection?

I wonder, who in in our church, in our society and in our world today could experience inclusion?

As we go out this week, I fervently pray that we can ask these questions of ourselves and each other.

Living God, Loving Saviour, Empowering Spirit, we lift up to you these prayers with the deep knowledge that you hear us and are working with us to create your Kingdom of justice and joy.

May we share your love with one another and build your church to be a reflection of the life of your Son Jesus Christ. May your life giving Spirit mould and shape the church helping it to build community in the dark places, where your light shines, your love is shown and your compassion recognised; by those of faith and no faith.

May your Spirit be at the heart of all we do? Use the power of the wind to energise, create and refresh our relationships that we may continue to transform your world, honour your creation and redeem our streets.
