Readings

Reflection

Have you ever had a complaint made against you? It is what we all dread: finding out that someone has made a complaint about you. ...and worse bit is you have no idea what it is about. Most people will be asking themselves what have I done – especially if it is not the first one.

Here are some things you may have considered at the time.... Not to have a knee-jerk reaction as news that someone has made a complaint will come as a shock. Keep calm. Start your own investigation as you need to get some information. Speaking from experience (say no more) It is hard to get the details due to issues around confidentiality and one has to wait until that dreaded letter arrives. If you were in a union you would contact them and appraise them of your situation. ...

My apologies if that short introduction brought back some very unhappy memories. Today I would like us to consider how Jesus handled his situation when a specific complaint reached his heart. In his case he didn't need to wait for the letter to arrive. Let's set the context for us today as I am sure Jesus will be using it in his defence.

If this was a play we could divide it into two parts (Simon is taking note here for the next production) Part I: Jesus answers the criticism from the religious leaders. Jesus responds to complaints about "this teaching" by pointing to the whole story from cross to resurrection and ascension. Part II: Jesus asks whether The Twelve "wish" to remain with him; and then the dramatic ending where the story continues, as Jesus know that betrayal and denial are yet to come. Do you still wish to remain?

John our Gospel writer invites us to continue as this journey is no- where near an ending.

Let me take you back to the last four Sundays as this bread eating, life giving blessing has been going on awhile. So many say that maybe it would have been easier if John has just written the Eucharist narrative. I think John wanted to show us how important the presence of Jesus is to our unity, our oneness and being connected through the Spirit.

Week 1 – With the crowd, we had the feeding of the five thousand and more (women and of course children) as it was the little boy who demonstrated love. Jesus then blessed it and showed us the economy of life – a little can go a long way. Let us remind our government as they decide to cut the overseas aid budget. Week 2 – Jesus says the famous "I am the bread" and asked us to believe.

Week 3 – Local boy causes a stir. I knew him when … He is now talking about coming down from the Father in heaven, giving eternal life. He knows our story and he is saying he is the living bread. Week 4 – Smaller crowd in the Synagogue, Jesus takes things even deeper and talks about eating his flesh and drinking his blood. My flesh is true food and my blood is true drink (verse 55).

Before, Jesus answered criticism from the religious leaders. Now, the complaining comes from those who have been following him. Those who decide to leave attribute their decision to "this teaching". Jesus said "feed on me" is, in fact, at the heart of the offense and the complaint

Many of the disciples turn back and leave-off following Jesus. Peter shows that the Twelve have been reacting in receptive ways to Jesus' teaching (remaining, hearing, knowing, and believing) Because Jesus knows the secret thoughts of those around him, he is aware that his disciples are complaining about him. "Does this offend you?" he asks. The question implies that, yes, **this Jesus offends**. However, the next question seems more open-ended: "Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before?" You have seen, you have tasted now what would you make about the Son of Man going up into heaven?

In other words, the decision to leave (or stay) is arguably premature without the full understanding of the death, resurrection, and ascension of Christ, and the gift of the Holy Spirit

While Jesus might be trying to sort through the nature of the difficulty mentioned in the complaint his explanation seems to take us to another level: "It is the Spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life". Let us cast our minds back to the conversation Jesus had with Nicodemus. No one can **see** the kingdom of God, without being born from above. No one can **enter** the kingdom of God without being born of water and of Spirit.

The words Jesus speaks are in unity with the life-giving spirit of the real or true bread from heaven. Human beings are born anew not by the will of the flesh or of the will of human beings, but by the will of God. Jesus' question to The Twelve: "Do you also wish to go away?"

The Twelve remain because they have made an informed (and human) decision. We could digress here and look at being called / election and being chosen. Which wins? Divine election or human decision? That is maybe for another time. Today is about where we are on our journey together. As we consider going back to our buildings some people will not return and we will be heart broken. The Bible tells us that there is lots of information and things out there that will draw us away. So many arguments and counter arguments. Where do you stand this morning? Its reasonable (and human) to doubt but where you need to be is strong in your belief in God who feeds us the true bread. The drama of belief and unbelief continues to be acted out in the world of the living.

Maybe when we read this text, we want to say that we would be with Peter and with The Twelve, and we would continue with Jesus. Rock-solid with Jesus. When the roll is called up yonder, we will be counted among the saints. Or perhaps when we read this text, we want to say that it's okay to doubt, that it's honest to doubt. After all, Peter who spoke so movingly a moment ago in our reading, will a few chapters hence speak in a very different way.

Or maybe the belief or unbelief that we claim isn't the point. Authenticity in the fellowship of believers seems to be important point in this reading. If we look back to last week's reading in 1 Kings 3:5 as Solomon prayed God appeared to him in a dream and said, "Ask what I should give you" So this morning, are we feeding on that bread of life? What do you desire from God? **Amen**
